A story by Eleanor Bowling, aged 7



When folk find that their bodies are not working properly they usually, if they can get an appointment, visit the doctor.

"Doctor, doctor, I am sure I am a pair of curtains....'Well, pull yourself together then!" "Doctor, doctor, I can't get to sleep at night.'...'Well, lie on the edge of the bed, you'll soon drop off!"

Often, the way to recovery is to do something differently—more rest, stop smoking, walk, don't drive, take the medicine prescribed. I am concerned about the damage we have done to the world and so I am part of the Church's Eco group. At home I try to buy and use as many Eco friendly products as possible.




The changing look of flowers

Maybe it surprises you that this quote from the Bible goes alongside the 'Paddington hard stare'?!

As a birthday treat, I went along to see the new Paddington film, and as someone who likes to find wisdom in anything and everything, this film was no exception. Don't worry, I am not going to give any spoilers, but do go and see it if you get chance!

The part that jumped out at me was when Paddington gives someone his 'Hard stare'. Inevitably the recipient of that stare gets all hot under the collar and feels very uncomfortable, like a child being caught with their hand in the biscuit tin. Paddington explains that 'It's a Hard Stare. It's for when people have forgotten their manners or what's important'.

I found myself wishing that Paddington would give a few people in the real world that stare!! But also, if we are honest, don't we need that reminder (maybe a gentle nudge rather than a hard stare) to focus on what's important? Don't we get caught up in the 'busyness' and get overwhelmed by the news on the TV and lose sight of what gives meaning, purpose and belonging in our lives...?

I saw something on Facebook the other day that really struck me. It was something along the lines of 'Everyone should go out in nature every day for at least twenty minutes.
